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

Pompe Stevens, a revolutionary-era slave, believed to have come from the West Indies, worked as an assistant to stone-cutter & stonemason John Stevens, a prominent Newport RI businessman. After the American Revolution, Newport's free blacks formed their own religious organizations, including the African Union Society, the nation's first self-help group for African-Americans. Stevens was among them. No longer a slave, he embraced his African name, "Zingo", and so inscribed the volume offered here. Extremely rare. \$15000



The First Light Infantry Company was formed in 1818 as a state militia company based in Providence. The Company helped suppress the Olney's Lane race riots in 1831. It was also involved in

suppressing the Dorr Rebellion. Many of the Company members also served in the American Civil War.

The activities recorded herein, written in pen and by necessity by many different individuals given the span of time involved, are detailed and informative accounts of the daily, weekly, and monthly meetings of the Company. Often, a newspaper article that mentions the Company has been affixed to the closely written mss pages, further documenting the Company's history. Together, these volumes are the primary source for the history of the First Light Infantry Company, and as such, are invaluable for understanding the inner workings of the Company and their sometimes significant role in 19th C. Rhode Island history. \$20000


Following the death of her mother, Smith was left in the care of her abusive, alcoholic father. On Thanksgiving Day, 1891, she attempted to stand up for herself and refused to cook dinner for her father. He beat her and then held her arms against the stove, burning her so severely doctors were forced to amputate both limbs. Smith became a ward of the Children's Home Society of Illinois, living at the Home for Destitute and Crippled Children. By 1905, a fund established to pay for her care was exhausted and Smith began supporting herself by selling drawings and autobiographical pamphlets. The outpouring of support allowed her to found the Kittie Smith Company. She aspired to help children with disabilities overcome their handicaps and displayed a remarkable set of skills to illustrate that nothing was impossible. In 1913, under Illinois' new women's suffrage law, Smith was the first woman in Chicago to cast a ballot – and she did so using only her feet. By the 1930s, Smith was working as a professional armless wonder, exhibiting at Coney Island as well as with the Ringling Bros., Barnum & Bailey and John Robinson circuses.



Authentic memoir of a life in jazz by Milt "The Judge" Hinton, the "dean of jazz bass players." Hinton played with Cab Calloway's orchestra from 1936 to 1951 and other jazz greats including Louis Armstrong, Count Basie, Benny Carter, Duke Ellington, Dizzy Gillespie, and Billie Holiday. Inscribed and dated in the year of publication by Milt Hinton to legendary jazz saxophonist, trumpeter, and bandleader Benny Carter (1907-2003) on the front flyleaf. Einstein, Albert (1879-1955). **THE WORLD AS I SEE IT**. Translated from the German by Alan Harris. New York: Covici-Friede, 1934. First American Edition. *The twentieth century's most brilliant scientific thinker shares his views on the meaning of life, governments, economics, disarmament, war, and Judaism. Written mostly in 1932, these short pieces are affecting mainly because they predate World War II, the Holocaust, Israeli-Palestinian wars (Einstein thought they should get along), and the European Common Market. Also included is Einstein's explanation, in general terms for the lay reader, of his landmark*



Theory of Relativity. This copy is inscribed by Einstein on the half-title: "Herr Milton Lesser/ Albert Einstein" (full signatures are more scarce). Lesser's bookplate appears on the front pastedown. 
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

Some light wear to the spine ends, light rubbing and vertical creasing to spine, hinges cracked or just starting in volume I, a small former owner signature to the



front endpaper of each volume, and overall a tight and very good set. The White Company, set in 1366-7 during the Hundred Year's War, concerns a mercenary company of archers. Doyle mixes his own fictional characters among historical figures such as Edward the Black Prince and Peter of Castile. Although mostly known for his Sherlock Holmes series, Doyle greatly regarded his historical novels, such as this one, which intertwined themes of love and war. \$4,500



Sadly and far too soon, Roger Gozdecki passed away on April 16, 2012. He is survived by his wife Dr. Mary Ellen, son Matthew, and father Edward.

Easy to spot in the aisles at book fairs with his ever present smile and signature suspenders (or braces, as he preferred to call them), Roger was the proprietor of Anthology Rare Books, Ltd. in Pasadena, California. Among his specialties were California and the West, Angling, and Literature, especially E.E. Cummings whose

work Roger credited with leading him to a career as a bookseller. Roger assembled one of the largest private collections of Cummings' work, and his vigorous recitations of Cummings' idiosyncratic verse, often from memory, were a real joy for those fortunate to have heard them.

Born on Valentine's Day in 1956, Roger was the eldest of his parents' four sons. His father's career in the U.S. Air Force led to a somewhat itinerant childhood during which Roger attended ten different schools in California and the Southwest over the course of twelve years of public schooling. He fondly remembered his high school years in Atwater, California where he excelled in wrestling, football, and other athletic pursuits. Later, Roger attended Whittier College where he met Mary Ellen.

In 1979, as a Christmas present to himself, Roger purchased a first edition of The Enormous Room (1922) by E.E. Cummings. It was the first important edition he ever acquired and the man he purchased it from, Charles Jimenez of The Little Old Bookshop in Whittier, California, would soon thereafter offer Roger a job to manage his new store, The Book Shop in Covina, California, which opened in 1981. Five years later, Roger purchased The Book Shop, which he owned and operated as a purveyor of "first-class second-hand books" until 2006, when he sold the business to Brad and Jen Johnson who continue its operations today.

Throughout his career, Roger took seriously his commitment to educate the public and the trade about rare books and bookselling. He wrote articles for Firsts Magazine, as well for Interloc and other online entities, and for the ABAA Newsletter. He also frequently lectured at public libraries about book collecting and never failed to participate in appraisal events at book fairs. On book collecting, he once wrote: "At the end of the day, I recommend that everyone collect what makes him or her happy. In an increasingly homogenized world, rare books often furnish insights into ways of life and past experiences that most people can't even begin to imagine. Change occurs with such relentless speed in our world that modern life often appears to be aimed at denying our own individuality as human beings. Most book collectors discover that the real value of their collection lies in the deep personal satisfaction that it affords them. What matters most over time is that collectors' own appreciation for their books is what continues to increase exponentially."

With his indomitable spirit and infectious zeal, Roger led countless souls to discover the joys of book collecting, and we as a trade and a community who share a passion for the printed word are richer for it.



Includes several photographs captured aboard Grey's yacht, the Gladiator, in the waters off Southern California, as well as a number of images of Grey with his secretary and mistress, Mildred Smith, and with Louise Anderson, who was a teenager when the 50-year-old Grey is supposed to have taken her as a lover. It seems that Grey collected some of his best photographs to be printed in this large format album (most Grey albums contain smaller, standard format images). Some of the views of Catalina and the American Southwest are truly spectacular. Original black morocco album (18 1/2" x 10 1/8"), with "Catalina" handwritten on the front. Light staining to the fore-edge of the last few leaves, affecting one image, and causing a blank concluding leaf to be affixed to the rear pastedown. Some general minor shelfwear, with a few bumps along the extremities, the shadow of a spine label, and some shallow loss at the spine heel; otherwise very good. "Always referred to as the 'Thompson & West, Los Angeles County,' it is one of the rarest of that fine early series of California county histories. This valuable history was compiled from the newspapers of the county from 1854 to 1880, as well as city and county records, and from interviews with many early pioneers." Oblong quarto. Original leather-backed black cloth binding, with gilt titles on the spine and front, and decorative blind-stamping on both panels. Mild edgewear and soiling to the extremities of some pages. A lengthy tear to p.107-108 has been repaired with non-archival tape (faint offsetting to opposing plate). Another non-archival tape repair to a short tear along the fore-edge of the first Table of Contents page. Some creasing to the title page and the preceding blank leaf, with some neat archival tape repair, and a large chip to the bottom corner of the blank leaf. Though the hinges are starting, the binding remains quite sound. The leather has been expertly refurbished, and the corners skillfully consolidated. 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

Illustrated with twenty-three plans (some folding) depicting various formations of troops, and text illustrations of soldiers. Scarce military manual from the Nauvoo Legion leader that was prepared for the Utah territorial militia. Nice copy of this uncommon work. \$5,000

Orson Pratt (1811-1881) was baptized into the fledgling Mormon faith in September of 1830, and he would spend the next five decades in the service of his faith. Pratt was an original member of the Quorum of the Twelve and acted as the LDS Church Historian and Recorder for a number of years. Pratt wrote and edited dozens of works in his lifetime. \$1,500

Although both published in 1893, the English language edition of Nordenskiold's pioneering work on the ruins of Mesa Verde is the far more scarce edition of the two and contains over fifty additional pages, primarily illustrative, than does the Swedish edition. Nordenskiold came to the American southwest in 1891 at the invitation of Richard Wetherill, a local cattle rancher, who along with Charles Mason is credited with discovering the Mesa Verde ruins. This collection contains Nordenskiold's notes and photographs of his travels and excavations in the area. The Swedish edition contained seventeen full page plates; this edition contains fifty-one plates. This edition also contains an appendix titled: "Human Remains from the Cliff Dwellings of Mesa Verde", by G. Retzius. The appendix contains ten full page plates. These large plates include some absolutely exquisite photo gravures of the ruins, including the double page centerfold of "The Cliff Palaces". Also includes 159 smaller black and white illustrations. Full page map present at the rear. The earliest scholarly monograph on Mesa Verde. Mesa Verde comprises some of the most spectacular American Indian ruins in all of North America. \$5,000


puppet is signed and dated by both Sandow Birk and Elyse Pignolet and accompanied by a poster from the feature film.

California artist Sandow Birk's random discovery of an old copy of

Dante's The Divine Comedy in a used bookstore in Los Angeles led to the creation of original artwork, a series of books, and finally, in 2008, an animated feature film. The worn volume discovered by Birk featured the iconic 19th century illustrations of French engraver Gustave Doré, and Birk was captivated not only by the classic text and its vivid depictions of the afterlife, but also by the exquisite, detailed images that placed Dante's poem in a concrete reality. Birk made both Dante and Doré a starting point for a new project. The concept was to mimic the style and feel of Doré's illustrations while depicting urban America in the 21st Century. The project developed



with the help of writer Marcus Sanders and Trillium Press into an ornate book, *Dante's Inferno*, which was printed in an edition of 100, containing 72 hand-printed lithographs and bound in gold-stamped leather. *Dante's Purgatorio* and *Dante's Paradiso* followed, and all three books were published in commercial editions by Chronicle Books to great success – garnering reviews in the *London Review of Books, The Wall Street Journal*, and selected as one of the "Best Books of 2005" by National Public Radio's David Kipen. In addition to fine press and trade editions of his adaptation, Birk, with the assistance of his wife, artist Ely-



se Pignolet, and director Sean Meredith, adapted *Inferno* into an animated feature film. Set in the present and using contemporary figures, settings, and situations to illustrate the nine circles of hell, the story is performed in the style of Victorian toy theater, with paper and stick puppets.

(artist's site) "In a project that extended through the 1990s, painter/printmaker Michael Mazur and poet Robert Pinsky col-



laborated on the production of a new illustrated translation of The Inferno. Mazur said that in grappling with Dante, he reinvigorated his own artistic creativity. Pinsky, who became Poet Laureate of the United States in 1997, credited Mazur's imagery with deepening his own understanding of the poem. In a shift from the practice of earlier artists, Mazur did not show Dante travelling through hell; instead, he showed his interpretation of what Dante saw. Mazur's investigation of The Inferno involved a series produced in various mediums culminating in a grand portfolio of etchings, the entirety of which appears alongside a selection of Dante's verses translated by Pinsky."

Twenty-three color printed etchings by Bogardus. Text printed by Arthur Larson, Horton Tank Graphics. Bound by Gray Parrot. "The Great Mystery is a collaboration between the artist Peter Bogardus, who made the etchings, and Russell Means, who composed a handwritten text that has been reliefprinted. The initial concept for the project occurred during a visit by the artist to the Oglala Lakota Indian Reservation at Pine Ridge, South Dakota. Allowed access to tribal archives, Mr. Bogardus was able to study many original photographic references. The iconography in these ancient images of the then still free Plains peoples provided inspiration for the etchings. At the same time the reality of late 20th century reservation life served to temper any tendency to romanticize the past. Thus the etchings are a vehicle for revisiting history while the text by Russell Means connects this history to the present, the

"now time." Mr. Means is an Oglala Lakota and one of the founders of the American Indian Movement; he was instrumental in activating pride among his people and awareness of their condition among the people of the larger US society and beyond. His captions to the etchings are contemporary responses to the history of his peoples' contact with those who came from Europe." R. Means passed away in 2012.


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
